First Reading Zechariah 9:9-12

The coming messianic king will inaugurate an era of disarmament and prosperity. Because of God's covenant with Israel, they are designated as "prisoners of hope."

⁹Rejoice greatly, O daughter Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter Jerusalem! Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he, humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey. ¹⁰He will cut off the chariot from Ephraim and the war-horse from Jerusalem;
and the battle bow shall be cut off, and he shall command peace to the nations;
his dominion shall be from sea to sea, and from the River to the ends of the earth.
¹¹As for you also, because of the blood of my covenant with you, I will set your prisoners free from the waterless pit.

Reflection

How does the king enter Jerusalem? (verse 9) You may be familiar with this image from the Palm Sunday Gospel—see Matthew 21:1-11. What do you think this image means for the people of Jerusalem? What does it mean to you? The king is also a warrior. What does this warrior do? (verse 10) I'm used to the image of a warrior who brings war. What is the result of this warrior's arrival? Notice the geography in verse 10. Notes in the Lutheran Bible say that the territory imagine here is greater than the land under Persian control. What does this geographical note say about who is truly the king? What do you think the blood of the covenant refers to? (verse 11) Whose blood? What will happen to those who have been imprisoned by the enemy? (verse 12)

Reflection

These verses are like a statement of faith. What is the faith they proclaim? (verses 8-9) They also portray the kingdom of God. Who is subject to this kingdom? (verse 10) What do they do as subjects of the king? (verses 11-12) How long will this kingdom last? (verse13) What does the Lord, as king, do for those who are not strong and wealthy? (verses 13a-14) Do you think earthly rulers have a responsibility to follow in the footsteps of the heavenly king? Why or why not?

Second Reading Romans 7:15-25a

Life enslaved under sin is a catch-22 existence in which we know good but do not do it and do things we know to be bad. Through Jesus Christ, God has set us free from such a futile existence.

¹⁵I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. ¹⁶Now if I do what I do not want, I agree that the law is good. ¹⁷But in fact it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. ¹⁸For I know that nothing good dwells within me, that is, in my flesh. I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. ¹⁹For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. ²⁰Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me.

²¹So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. ²²For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, ²³but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. ²⁴Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? ^{25a}Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!

Reflection

Parts of Romans are very difficult to understand. I don't think this text is one of them. What is Paul's confession about his intentions regarding his actions? (verse 15) I think verse 16 speaks of his intention, which is to follow the law, but he finds it very difficult to do. Verses 17-20 might seem like an excuse for not taking responsibility for what you do, since sin dwelling within me makes me do what the law forbids, but I think Paul is just saying what he finds to be true in himself. It's easy to think of this in personal terms: I don't want to eat that cookie, and I know it's not good for me, but I just can't stop thinking about it, and suddenly it's in my mouth! But there are also systemic ways in which we are entrapped by sin. For example, if you need a new dress or suit, and decide that you are going to shop for one, it's easy to find cheap clothes that look nice, but then you discover that they are probably made in a third world country by women who are grossly underpaid. So does your new suit or dress mean that you have contributed to the poverty of people who aren't paid a living wage? Here it's pretty easy to see, I think, that it is no longer I that do it, but the sin that dwells not only within me but all around me. No matter how good my intentions, I can't do everything right! —Which is what the law requires. What is God's response to this self-condemnation? (Verses 24-25)

Gospel

Matthew 11:16-19, 25-30

Jesus chides people who find fault with both his ministry and that of John the Baptist. He thanks God that wisdom and intelligence are not needed to receive what God has to offer.

[Jesus spoke to the crowd saying:] ¹⁶"To what will I compare this generation? It is like children sitting in the marketplaces and calling to one another,

¹⁷ We played the flute for you, and you did not dance;

we wailed, and you did not mourn.'

¹⁸For John came neither eating nor drinking, and they say, 'He has a demon'; ¹⁹the Son of Man came eating and drinking, and they say, 'Look, a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of tax collectors and sinners!' Yet wisdom is vindicated by her deeds."

²⁵At that time Jesus said, "I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants; ²⁶yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. ²⁷All things have been handed over to me by my Father;

and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.

²⁸"Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. ²⁹Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. ³⁰For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

Reflection

What is the problem with "this generation"? (verse 16) I think we're still in "this generation," in that there are complainers no matter what someone does. The expectations of "this generation" is that if you refuse to eat and drink except for locusts and wild honey, you're wrong! (If you eat too much meat, or not enough fish, or too many sweets, or not enough vegetables...) On the other hand, if you do eat and drink the wrong things, you're a glutton and a drunkard, and if you hang out with the wrong people, you're shameful. (verses 16-19) Do you recognize this? Who does Jesus hold up as the ones who really know what is the wisdom of God? (verses 25-26) Who knows Jesus? (verse 27) What do you see in your imagination when you see Jesus as one whose friends are "gluttons, drunkards, tax collectors, and sinners"? Do you think Jesus hung out with such as those out of a sense of duty, or did he truly enjoy being with them? Many of us care about our reputations (I know I do!), and what to be with "the right people." I haven't come all that far from junior high! What kind of a burden do you carry when you need to be though well of by "the right people"? What does Jesus invite us to do? (verses 28-30) How might it be easy and light to be with Jesus, not because you have to, but because he loves you? He is gentle and humble in heart, and offers our souls rest. What might it mean for us to rest our souls in Jesus, and to carry the "burden" of love that he offers us?
