## **FIRST READING**

**Acts 17:22-31**

*In Athens, Paul faces the challenge of proclaiming the gospel to Greeks who know nothing of either Jewish or Christian tradition. He proclaims that the "unknown god" whom they worship is the true Lord of heaven and earth who will judge the world with justice through Jesus, whom God has raised from the dead.*

<sup>22</sup>Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. <sup>23</sup>For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. <sup>24</sup>The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, <sup>25</sup>nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. <sup>26</sup>From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, <sup>27</sup>so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. <sup>28</sup>For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said,

'For we too are his offspring.'

<sup>29</sup>Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. <sup>30</sup>While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, <sup>31</sup>because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."

## **Reflection**

*Last Sunday we met Paul as Saul, the young man who participated in the stoning of Stephen. In this text, we meet him as the missionary to the Gentiles, preaching to the crowd in Athens. The Greeks did not want to offend any God, so they had an altar "to the unknown God." How does Paul speak to them? (verses 22-23) I think often when we think about talking about our faith in Jesus, we think we have to convince people that they are wrong and we are right. (Not surprisingly, that approach doesn't work very well.) How does Paul make connections with those he's speaking to? How does he identify God to them? (verses 23-28) If you heard Paul speak, what would you know about this God he is talking about? What does Paul urge his listeners to do? (verses 30-31) Does this work for Paul? (see verses 32-34) We are often urged not to talk about religion or politics. What in Paul's approach*

*might be helpful when we want to share our faith? What does this text teach us about sharing our faith in a culture of diversity?*

### **Reflection**

*How do we bless God? (verse 8) Why should we give God praise? (verse 9) What is the psalmist's assumption about bad or difficult things that happen to us as God's people? (verses 10-12) How has God blessed the people? (verse 12) How does the psalmist bless God? (verses 13-15) This does not describe how we worship. What do we do to bless God? How does the psalmist celebrate the relationship the community has with God? (verses 16-17) How has God affirmed and blessed that relationship? (verses 18-20)*

## **SECOND READING**

### **1 Peter 3:13-22**

*Christians have a zeal for doing what is right in God's eyes no matter what the circumstances because in baptism we are saved and made alive. Thus our Christian beliefs and behavior are to be a matter of public record just as our baptism is.*

<sup>13</sup>Who will harm you if you are eager to do what is good? <sup>14</sup>But even if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, <sup>15</sup>but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; <sup>16</sup>yet do it with gentleness and reverence. Keep your conscience clear, so that, when you are maligned, those who abuse you for your good conduct in Christ may be put to shame. <sup>17</sup>For it is better to suffer for doing good, if suffering should be God's will, than to suffer for doing evil. <sup>18</sup>For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, <sup>19</sup>in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, <sup>20</sup>who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. <sup>21</sup>And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, <sup>22</sup>who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

### **Reflection**

*The author of 1 Peter encourages Christians to keep faith even when they are suffering. What do you think of the exhortation that if we are eager to do what is good no one will harm us? (verse 13) What do you think is the blessing in suffering for doing what is right? (verse 19) I can imagine that it is a blessing not to be intimidated by those who want you to be afraid. How does "sanctify[ing] Christ as Lord" help us to not be afraid? The letter of 1 Peter is written by one who is not afraid, and who is full of hope, perhaps in spite of all that is going on. Do you have hope? Why is hope important? How do you account for the hope in your heart and mind? As I read this, I am struck by the exhortation to gentleness and reverence when we defend our hope. That surely can only be done by someone who is not full of fear! Why is it important to have a clear conscience? (verses 16-17) Again, I think that we can only have a clear conscience if we are not afraid of the wrong people and the wrong things. What do you think? Who is the author's model for such hope and faith? (verse 18) What is the author's understanding of the work of Christ for those who did not die in faith? (verses 19-20—you may recognize this from the Apostles' Creed, when we confess our faith in Jesus, "who descended to the dead" (or to hell, as we used to say). What has Jesus accomplished for them, and for us? (verses 21-23) In this text, the author sees in the story of Noah and the flood a reference to baptism. How has the flood of baptism saved you?*

### **\*GOSPEL**

**John 14:15-21**

*In final words to his disciples on the night of his arrest, Jesus encourages obedience to his commandments and speaks of the Spirit, who will be with them forever.*

[Jesus said to the disciples:] <sup>15</sup>"If you love me, you will keep my commandments. <sup>16</sup>And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. <sup>17</sup>This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you.

<sup>18</sup>"I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. <sup>19</sup>In a little while the world will no

longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. <sup>20</sup>On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. <sup>21</sup>They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them.”

**Reflection**

*This text begins, “If you love me...” Has anyone ever said that to you? Or perhaps you have said that to someone. What usually comes after “If you love me...”? Perhaps your child, or a boyfriend or girlfriend said that to you, or even a parent or spouse. Here Jesus is saying it to you. What does he want us to do “if you love me”? What are Jesus’ commandments? (If you can’t remember, see John 13:34-35) If we love Jesus, we will keep his commandments. What will he do for us to help us to do that? (verses 15-17) “Advocate” is the translation of the Greek word *paraclete* (this name for the Spirit is only used in John’s gospel), which means “one who is called alongside.” Other translations of this word might be “helper,” “comforter,” “encourager,” “intercessor.” (From notes in the Lutheran Bible.) How will this Advocate help us? (verse 17) Even though Jesus is leaving his disciples, what is his promise to them? (verse 18) How will we experience the presence of Jesus with us? (verse 19) Once again, Jesus refers to his unity with God the Father, and with us as his believers. (verse 20) How will we know that we love Jesus, and he and the Father love us? (verse 21) Again, this is not a teaching to be diagrammed, but perhaps to be danced. How do you understand this unity of believers with Jesus and with his Father? If you don’t understand it (!), how do you experience it in your life of faith?*
