FIRST READING Acts 8:26-40

Led by the Spirit, Philip encounters an Ethiopian official who is returning to his African home after having been to Jerusalem to worship. Philip uses their encounter to proclaim the gospel to him. Upon coming to faith in Jesus, the Ethiopian is baptized by Philip.

²⁶An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) ²⁷So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." ³⁰So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" ³¹He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. ³²Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth.

33In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation?

For his life is taken away from the earth."

³⁴The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" ³⁵Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. ³⁶As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" ³⁸He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. ³⁹When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

Reflection

Philip is one of the "deacons" chosen from among the community to make sure that everyone was taken care of in the distribution of food. (See Acts 6:1-6) This portion of Acts is devoted to stories of these men, particularly Stephen (Acts 6-7) and Philip (Acts 8). Who did Philip meet, at the direction of the Spirit? (verses 26-27) Note that this was an important official from Ethiopia. What do we know about him? (verses 27-28) He was a believer, and trying to read the prophet Isaiah, and having no more success than any one of us reading Isaiah for the first time without an interpreter. So what did Philip do? (verses 30-35) This is an example of how important it is to study the Scripture and ask questions. How does Philip interpret this Scripture to him? (The portion of Isaiah quoted here is a different translation of Isaiah 53:7b-8.) What does the man want next? (verse 36) So what happens? (verse 38) I think this is another example of Jesus telling the disciples not to worry about what they will say if they are asked by the authorities, because the Spirit will give them words. It's also an example of loving God with all your mind! What do you think?

Psalm 22:25-31

Reflection

This is the end of the psalm which Jesus quoted the beginning of from the cross. (See Mark 15:33-34 and Psalm 22:1) Does anything surprise you about this psalm? How does this text from the psalm answer the question asked at the beginning? What are the signs in this psalm that God has not forsaken the psalmist, or Jesus, or us, or our descendants? What difference does it make to your children, grandchildren, great...great-grandchildren that you trust in God?

SECOND READING 1 John 4:7-21

We love God and others because God first loved us. We cannot say we love God, whom we have not seen, while hating fellow Christians, whom we regularly see. Love toward God is to be matched by love toward others because the essence of God is love.

⁷Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. ⁹God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹²No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

¹³By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. ¹⁵God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. ¹⁶So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. ¹⁷Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. ¹⁸There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. ¹⁹We love because he first loved us. ²⁰Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. ²¹The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

Reflection

What is our defining characteristic as a community if we know and love God? (verses 7-8) How do we know that God loves us? (verses 9-10) How must we respond to God's love? (verse 11) Jesus said to the disciples after his resurrection, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." (John 20:29) How does the writer of 1 John say that we "see" God? (verse11) How else do we know God? (verses 13-16) There is much fear in our world today, and many who try to make sure we are afraid. What does the author of 1 John say about love and fear? (verses 17-18) Fear is often at the root of hatred or prejudice. What does the writer of 1 John say about this? (verses 20-21) How do we love those who are different from us?

*GOSPEL John 15:1-8

On the night of his arrest, Jesus taught his disciples about the relationship they would have with him. Those who abide in his word and love would bear fruit, for apart from him, they could do nothing.

[Jesus said:] "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. ²He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. ³You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. ⁴Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. ⁵I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. ⁶Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. ⁷If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. ⁸My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."

Reflection

This is the reflection of Jesus on the relationship between us and Jesus, and Jesus and the Father. What is the sign that we are alive in Christ? (verses 2-4) What happens to those branches that do not bear fruit? (verses 2, 4, 6) What is the fruit that we as Christians bear? What is the sign of faith in God and in Jesus? Are there parts of you that you fear or hope will be thrown into the fire? You may want to study Colossians 3:5-17 as you reflect on this.
